RECYCLING EVENTS

River Forest will be holding three recycling events where residents can come to properly throw away electronics and old appliances.

The events, co-hosted by the village and Vintage Tech, a Romeoville disposal company, will be held <u>April 28, July 28, and Oct. 27</u>, from 9am to 1pm in the west Thatcher parking lot, located on the west side of the 400 block of Thatcher Avenue, across from the Metra train station.

Electronics that can no longer simply be thrown out or recycled by the curb include: TVs, monitors, printers, computers, electronic keyboards, fax machines, videocassette recorders, portable digital music players, digital video disc players, video game consoles, small scale servers, scanners, computer mice, digital converter boxes, cable receivers, satellite receivers and digital video disc recorders. All of the devices contain metals and or plastics with toxic compounds that can pose serious environmental threats if dumped in landfills.

Triton College will also be holding a recycling event at 9am to 1pm on **May 4** in Triton's North parking lot. Triton will college electronics, clothes, unwanted medications and shoes to recycle with Vintage Tech Recyclers and USAgain. QUERY QUOTATIONS

Rooted in the history of Friends, queries reflect the Quaker way of life, reminding Friends of the ideals we seek to attain. We approach queries as a guide, using them not as an outward set of rules, but as a framework within which we assess our convictions and examine prayerfully the direction of our lives and the life of the community. Here are a few selections from Faith and Practice, published in 1997 by Philadelphia Yearly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends:

Care for the Meeting Community

Are love and unity maintained among us? When conflicts exist, are they faced with patience, forbearance, and openness to healing? Are avenues for exploring differences kept open? To what extent does our Meeting ignore differences in order to avoid possible conflicts?

Is the Meeting a safe, loving place? When we become aware of someone's need, do we offer assistance? Are the meetinghouse and the Meeting property physically accessible to all?

Do all adults and children in our Meeting receive our loving care and encouragement to share in the life of our Meeting, and to live as Friends? Do we truly welcome newcomers and include them in our Meeting community?

When a member's conduct or manner of living gives cause for concern, how does the Meeting respond?

How does our Meeting keep in touch with all its members?

Am I ready to offer assistance as part of my religious community serving its members? Am I equally willing to accept graciously the help of others?

Do I recognize and face disagreements and other situations that put me in conflict with others? Do I manifest a spirit ready to give or receive forgiveness?

Do I treat adults and children alike with respect and without condescension? Is my manner with visitors and attenders to my Meeting one of welcome?
