Project Lakota

Project Lakota is in desperate need of funds. They are currently about \$1300 overspent (i.e., no money in the bank) on heating & utility bills along with emergency vehicle repair with this unbelievably harsh winter on the Pine Ridge reservation (Lakota nation). It is always a hard winter up there, but even worse this year. Some of Project Lakota's friends with Partnership for Housing foresaw that late last summer with the large wild fruit and nut harvest, but still, it is hard to bring in that much firewood. News came recently that the tribe was out of heating/utility assistance money for elders.

Also, Ana's roof on her trailer is falling in. Project Lakota has been trying to help with that and trying to get Minerva's woodstove moved from her old trailer to the

new one, to help keep her from having heating bills that are \$600 every month. These old FEMA trailers are hardly insulated.

We have decided to start with a 4-week study group based around the video series, Painting the Stars: Science, Religion and an Evolving Faith. ARE is also hoping to organize a book study for the summer or fall if mid-week gatherings find a positive reception. We encourage other committees or individuals to organize programs for the future (both one–off and multi week is fine).

The gatherings are scheduled for Weds April 9th, 16th, 25th, and 30th. Please feel free to come to all or just one or any number in between. We will be meeting at Cossy Ksander's home at 7 pm and will finish around 8:30.

About the series Painting the Stars: "The theme of each session exposes participants to observations and ideas about the intersection of science and faith that seek to be a catalyst for discussion about the promise of evolutionary Christian spirituality. The themes are arranged in order to provide a broad introduction to the conversation that is going on among theologians and other thought leaders on the leading edge of wrestling with where Christianity is going in the 21st century." Each week we will watch a short video. The video come with multiple materials to help facilitate a multi perspective spiritual discussion. We hope to gain clarity a understanding on an important contemporary issue with Quakerism, does a religion need God?

Please note we can not meet the first Wednesday of April, but fortunately April 2014 has 5 Wednesdays. We hope you'll join us.

Does our Meeting prepare all its members and children for worship and for a way of life consistent with the principles of the Religious Society of Friends? How do we teach about Quaker practices in business and worship and their importance to the functioning of our Meeting community?

In what ways do we support each other in order to seek God's will and act upon our understanding of truth? Is there opportunity in our Meeting to share the excitement of religious discovery and the possiblity of religious transformation?

Does our Meeting provide opportunities for all in the Meeting to learn about:

- the Inner Light, the living Christ within, the Bible, the writings of Friends, our Christian heritage, other religious traditions and their respective roles in the history and formation of Friends' principles?
- the common testimonies Friends declare?
- the variety of expression Quaker faith takes today?

Do I maintain as part of my personal and family life those daily practices that focus on continued spiritual growth, with disciplined worship, inward retirement, and communion with the divine spirit?

Do I frequently read the Bible and other religious literature, including the records of the lives and experiences of Friends? Do I take the time to explore these resources with others, and likewise encourage my children?

Do I share my own faith and spiritual journey, and encourage such sharing within my family?
